Thanks to primary care screening ramping back up from the back-log of the pandemic, pap smear rates have dramatically improved, almost back to pre-Covid levels. While barriers still exist to cervical cancer screening, we all recognize how important it is to our patients' health.

Unfortunately, our region has been flagged as having a higher rate of patients with high grade pap smears who have not received any follow-up compared to other regions in the province. This finding is sustained when correcting for the prolonged turn-around time of pap smear results. In addition, the wait times from high grade pap to colposcopy have increased in our region. This may be due to multiple factors: delayed referrals to colposcopy from primary care, increased wait times for scheduling the colposcopy appointments or longer intervals before the colposcopy can be completed.





Cervical Screening - Frequently Asked Question:

Why is there a change in the ASCUS recommendations from 6 months to 12 months?

The chances of developing cervical cancer with a low grade pap is low. Most ASCUS will resolve on there own in 12-24 months. It is unlikely that it would progress to high grade lesion or cancer within 6 months. Therefore, repeat pap smear at 12 months. If second ASCUS result, refer to colposcopy. See the OCSP Pathway above.

Central Region Cancer Screening Programs Data Update

To view the most recently available data (as of Mar. 15 2023) on the breast, cervical, and colorectal screening programs participation rates in the Central Region, click <u>here</u>.

Highlights:

- OBSP participation rate (58%) in Q3 has increased by 2.6% compared to Q2 in FY 22/23
- OCSP participation rate (51.7%) in Q3 has decreased by
 0.3% compared to Q2 in FY 22/23
- CCC overdue for screening rate has decreased by 0.3% in Q3 compared to Q2 in FY 22/23

NEW! Canada's Guidance on Alcohol and Health

In 2023, the Canadian Centre on Substance Use and Addiction released new guidance for Alcohol and Health. With significant advances in research over the past decade related to alcohol consumption and health, these recommendations are based on the best available evidence and will replace Canada's Low-Risk Alcohol Drinking Guidelines (LRDGs).


Highlights:

- The guidance no longer provides numerical limits for weekly or daily alcohol amounts.
- New guidance recommends people consider reducing their alcohol use and presents a continuum of risk as noted in the "Alcohol consumption per week" graphic below.
- If an individual has more than 2 drinks per week, aim not to exceed 2 drinks on one day.
- The recommendations are the same for males and females.
