January is Cervical Cancer Awareness Month



Cervical Screening Age

Ontario Health (Cancer Care Ontario) is encouraging primary care providers to start cervical screening for patients at age 25, instead of age 21.

However people who are immunocompromised who are or ever have been sexually active and fall into one of the following groups should continue to be screened starting at age 21:

- People who are living with human immunodeficiency virus (HIV)/acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS), regardless of viral load
- Organ transplant recipients (solid organ or allogeneic stem cell transplants)
- People requiring long-term treatment (either continuously or at frequent intervals) with medications that cause immune suppression.
- People who are living with systemic lupus erythematosus (SLE), regardless of whether they are receiving immunosuppressant treatment
- People with congenital (primary) immunodeficiency

Expansion of the Ontario Breast Screening Program for Individuals Ages 40-69 in FALL 2024

Happy New Year to everyone. In 2023, the Ontario Breast Screening Program, the largest screening program across Canada, saw tremendous growth with the inclusion of average risk women with implants and eligible Two-Spirit, trans and nonbinary people, the breast density notification across all ACR BI-RADS densities directly to participants and most significantly, and approving breast cancer screening for women between the ages of 40 and 49 promoting health equity, supporting early detection, and prioritizing the well-being of women. The team at the Central Regional Cancer Program has been regularly communicating with facilities



around effectively implementing these changes. I am motivated by their dedication to the program and greatly honoured to join their team as the Regional Breast Imaging Lead. 

March is Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month



What do you do when you get a POSITIVE FIT Result?

People who have a +FIT have a markedly elevated risk of colorectal cancer. While we are all aware that other things can cause the test to be positive, contamination, upper GI bleeding, significant dental bleeding and even benign colonic polyps, that should NOT stop us from acting, and acting with urgency.

Our new testing does not create false positives with things like meat ingestion like the old stool for occult blood testing could do, so it is much more reliable. If you get a positive FIT, the answer is NOT to repeat it. Positive is positive and we need to be recommending colonoscopy with some time urgency. We reviewed data on those patients who had FIT+ tests. I was amazed (as well as concerned and disappointed) that just creating the referral to the endoscopist took almost THREE weeks!

Hey, I know that it is one of MANY COMPETING priorities. I know that the patient has to be contacted and often a discussion is needed to see if they are willing to go for a colonoscopy. I am also not oblivious to the fact that there are significant, albeit unusual risks of colonoscopy like perforation.

I attach a diagram above of the data. The good news is that we are mostly hitting our target of having our patients who are FIT+ to get their colonoscopy WITHIN EIGHT WEEKS.

My message is clear and simple. Do NOT procrastinate. Send the referral (let's face it, using an EMR sending a referral only takes a minute ②). Yes, discussion needs to happen with the patient, and do so. We can, however, improve the metrics that are currently blaming primary care for a significant part of the delay. Let's work on this together.

<u>Provider Registration for</u> Patient Attachment

Unattached patients (those without a primary care provider) with increased risk of colon cancer and abnormal FIT can be attached to provider for proper follow up.

Reducing FIT Device Rejections

As of December 4, 2023, LifeLabs will now accept unexpired FIT devices for testing if they are returned no later than 12 months after the FIT kit was mailed. Prior to this change, FIT devices returned more than 6 months after mailing would be rejected, even though many were otherwise appropriate for testing.
